Murder in the first

Bristol woman pleads not guilty in killing of elderly neighbor

■ Prosecutors have not decided whether to seek death penalty in the case.

BLOUNTVILLE — A Bristol woman accused of robbing and killing an elderly neighbor has pleaded not guilty to premeditated first-degree murder and other

charges. Rachel Lynn Calhoun, 41, 1148 Reedy Creek Road, Bristol, Tenn., was arraigned in Sullivan County Circuit Court on Friday and

felony first-degree murder, especially aggravated robbery, identity theft, and fraudulent use of a credit

Calhoun and her co-defendant, Willie Mack Coleman, 61, of the same address, are accused in connection with the death of a neighbor, Johnny Shankel, 73.

According to police, Calhoun called 911 on Feb. 6 to report her neighbor was dead in his home. She later confessed to killing Shankel, and Coleman admitted he tried to help her cover up her crimes, police said. Authorities believe Shankel was murdered on Feb. 5, leaving his five dogs a full day to mutilate his remains before Calhoun called 911

What to do after wild week

Swings of more than 400 points in the Dow for four days in a row were frightening, but experts say investors should hold tight for now.

NEW YORK — Is it time to sell everything or buy with abandon?

Investors can't make up their minds. This week was one of the most volatile in the history of Wall Street. The Dow Jones industrial average swung more than 400 points four days in a row — down, then up, then down, then up.

It's frightening, but experts say the fear results partly because memories of the financial meltdown of 2008, when stocks lost half their value, are fresh.

Their advice: Hold tight. It's not time to sell, but it's probably not time to pour money into stocks, either.





Griffith: Glory days of federal grants are over

KINGSPORT — U.S. Rep. Morgan Griffith nods in agreement when he's reminded that his predecessor, Democrat Rick Boucher, was prolific at getting

federal grants for everything from broadband to water lines over a period of three decades.

That time, Griffith said, is

It's because the times are very different, and the federal government has a spending problem, the Virginia 9th Congressional District Republican said during a meeting with members of the Times-News Editorial Board.

"We're not in a position to shake the money tree, one because it's all spent, and two we banned earmarks, ..." Griffith said. "Now there are some things. ... day with no meals, is using the Lunch-Prepay.com program this fall. That replaces the pilot program for a few weeks last year that used MealsPayPlus. Lisa Holt, school nutrition manag-

er, said she is already receiving calls and questions about the LunchPrepay.com program highlighted on the system's Web site, www.sullivank12.net. Meal service will begin Tuesday, but LunchPrepay.com is in operation from a link on the system's Web site.

To use the new system, Holt explained parents must use their student or students' identification number to access the system.

Holt said that is not the same as the personal identification number (PIN) students punch in at the lunch rooms. She said the student ID number is on student report cards from the spring or can be obtained by parents from the school a student attends or by calling Valerie Wilson in the school nutrition office at 354-1018.

Director of Schools Jubal Yennie said the new system gives parents an option to use technology to replenish and track student meal accounts. Technology is becoming a cornerstone of the system, which in September plans to launch a BYOT (Bring Your Own Technology) program at Sullivan South High

Deputies reportedly found Shankel's body lying in a pool of blood on the laundry room floor. One of five dogs that animal control removed from the home was put down and autopsied, and human remains were found in its stomach.

While Calhoun was in court, Judge Jerry Beck asked Sullivan County Assistant District Attorney Jim Goodwin if he had decided whether the state intends to seek the death penalty for her. Goodwin had indicated that he was considering the option at Calhoun's last court appearance. This time Goodwin said he hopes to make a decision before Calhoun's next appearance, citing a need to collect additional information. Calhoun is scheduled to return to court on Oct. 14.

Friday marked Calhoun's first appearance with her newly appointed attorney, Larry Dillow. Dillow replaced Sullivan County Public Defender Steve Wallace as Calhoun's counsel.

At her last appearance, Beck had dismissed Wallace from the case to avoid a conflict after her co-defendant's lawyer, Justin Hutton, joined the public defender's office.

Coleman pleaded not guilty to charges of accessory after the fact, false report and tampering with evidence on July 29. It's alleged that he tried to help Calhoun cover up her crimes.

He is scheduled to return to court on Sept. 14 and is currently represented by attorney Kenneth Hill, whom he hired to replace Hutton.





the suit in Manhattan court on Wednesday.


The 28-year-old Brazilian soap opera star alleges that the 80-year-old Soros gave the \$1.9 million apartment on the Upper

Continued from page 1A trict. I voted to help put that money in the big pot.

"If we were running a 40 cent on every dollar surplus, I'm like any other politician. I'd say 'Let's get some money to this or that locality.' ... (But) I'm convinced the 9th District will do OK. When we're in this deep financial situation, I cannot tell you I'm going to get as much money as Rick Boucher over the last 20 years."

Griffith, the former Virginia House Majority leader, narrowly defeated Boucher in the 2010 election cycle and said he's now "looking at everything you're spending money on.'

He voted against two of the three major bills involving trillions of dollars in federal spending cuts and raising the nation's \$14.3 trillion debt ceiling.

Concerning his "no" vote on the Budget Control Act, also known as the debt ceiling deal that passed the House by more than 100 votes, Griffith said: "I think we needed to put down a marker. ... This was not a good deal. However, it was probably the best deal that leadership could craft. ... I felt comfortable voting no in the end ... (but) I probably would have voted for it if they needed the votes.'

Griffith, who described himself as "a rules guy," indicated he will bone up on knowing House rules to change federal mandatory spending habits.

He cited one bill passed last month that authorized \$2.9 million to be spent on an advisory agency helping the federal government in the regulatory pro-

"There are things in military construction I would have voted against," said Griffith, who added he has proposed a bill to cut congressional salaries by 10 percent.

The debt ceiling deal passed by Congress called for a vote on a balanced budget amendment to the U.S. Constitution, but Griffith did not believe the Democratcontrolled Senate will pass it.

"It works very well in Virginia," he said of the fiscal tool. "It's in our constitution. That means we make the tough choices. It doesn't mean we don't fight over what those tough choices are, but in my 17 years in the legislature ... the process works better when everyone knows there isn't any other choice but balanc-

ing the budget. It's not a question of can we print more money or delay the inevitable for another year or two years. It's a matter of you've got to get it balanced. I think the United States government needs to go in that direction.'

The debt ceiling deal also called for a bipartisan "super committee" of lawmakers to find more than \$1 trillion in additional cuts to be voted on by Congress by the end of the year or automatic cuts kick in.

Griffith said Congress needs a "Plan C" outside of that committee.

"There's a real fear that with the philosophical divide that we have between the controlling party in the Senate (Democrats) and the controlling party in the House (Republicans), that it's going to be harder to walk that tightrope," Griffith said of the committee. "I hope they understand no matter what they say publicly that they get on that tightrope and that means sometimes everybody has to feel a little bit uncomfortable. The fear is they will come up with something more conservative than the Senate will accept or more liberal than the House will

Military spending, said Griffith, might be one easy target for cuts. He said he voted on bringing home 10,000 of the 40,000 troops the United States has in Europe.

"I still think we need to keep an eye on Russia, but most of the eastern bloc (countries) are now NATO (North Atlantic Treaty Organization) allies," Griffith said. "We have made our European allies weak because we are covering so much of their defense ex penditures with our tax dollars. ... The British and French can't unseat (Libyan dictator) Moammar Gadhafi all by themselves. ... They're relying on us exclusive-

And the United States, said Griffith, has spent a "huge amount of money" in Afghanistan over a 10-year period.

"I am hesitant to say 'Pull out' and leave that investment by our young people without something positive to show for it," he said of the military presence in Afghanistan. "We may have to settle for something less than we originally wanted, which is a Democratic-Jeffersonian style of government. That ain't gonna happen."

meal history online and get an e-mail reminder when the account falls below a certain amount.

All parents can use the credit card and e-check options without paying the \$10. In addition, Holt said parents still may pay by check or cash at school.

"This certainly does not replace the fact they can send checks or cash at school," Holt said. "It's just an added convenience.'

Other changes for the 2011-12 school year include a 5 cent increase in most meal prices, although a la carte prices at the high school changed upward and downward.

Breakfast at all grade levels is \$1.30 this year, while lunch is \$1.90 at elementary school, \$2.05 at middle school, and \$2.15 at high

As for free and reduced price meal eligibility, Holt said the system encourages all parents to apply for their children.



Old railroad depot could be purchased for brewery

JOHNSON CITY — A Sevierville attorney has placed a 90-day option on the CC&O Railroad Depot, with the possibility of purchasing the historic property and developing it into a brewery.

The Johnson City Development Authority, the depot's owner, entered into an option agreement with Joseph A. Baker on Friday. Baker has 90 days to do due diligence, and if he chooses to buy the property, "it shall be for the primary purpose of operating an alcoholic beverage production and retail facility," according to the agreement.

Baker could not be reached for comment on Friday.

The production facility would use the warehouse, loading dock and office space upstairs for the business, said Robert Reynolds, CEO of the Washington County Economic Development Council. In the 90 days leading up to the option deadline, the possible buyers are also looking to partner with a restaurant to use the rest of the depot's available space, he said.

"There has been some discussion of that possibility," Reynolds said. "But the pur-

chase would not be contingent on the restaurant."

The JCDA would have final approval of the depot's use before any sale, and the interested party is intent on restoring and preserving the building's historical aspects, Reynolds emphasized to JCDA board members on Friday. He also said no zoning change would be needed, and the possible sale would serve to put the property on the tax rolls and create jobs.

In light of that, the JCDA would be willing to offer a heavily discounted price on the depot, Reynolds said. The purchase price listed in the option agreement is \$1, although officials said that might not be the final price.

"The building is in deplorable condition. Any viable project going in there could ask for TIF (tax increment financing), but we don't want to obligate TIF money for it. We would offer a reduced price," Reynolds said. "With a private owner, it would be on the tax rolls right away, generating revenue and job creation."

The option landed on the JCDA's desk just a little while after a previous contract with local developer Mitch Cox Cos. had expired. In early May, the Johnson City company also signed a 90-day option, with the possibility of purchasing and renovating the depot.

The JCDA purchased the depot in early 2010 for \$150,000.

Residents stage protest outside juvenile court

JOHNSON CITY — A small group of area residents gathered Friday near Johnson City Juvenile Court hoping to bring attention to what they call statesanctioned abuse committed against families and children in Tennessee and across the nation.

Ruth Cummins, the local protest coordinator for Govabuse, said the goal is to reform laws governing how child protective services — the Department of Children's Services in Tennessee — investigates claims of child abuse and the process used to find a suitable home while an in-

vestigation takes place.

dren away from us," Cummins

"There is nobody that oversees these people to make sure they're following federal law, state law and even their own policies," she said.

DCS caseworkers have sole power to remove children from a home when an allegation of child abuse is lodged against the parent or caregiver — allegations that are often false, Cummins said.

Too often, she said, a child is abused in a foster home as well.

"If it happens in a foster home, they won't do anything to a foster parent so the abuse continues in the foster home and there's no fear of repercussion.'

Her first experience with the DCS system started a year ago when she tried to get custody of her 4-year-old granddaughter, the child of her dead son. Cummins

said a DCS caseworker in Knoxville told her she would never get custody of the child and that she, the caseworker, would find a family to adopt the child out.

Cummins said she and her fiance, a veteran with full military benefits, were not allowed the opportunity to protest the adoption, and it was processed without them being contacted.

"I was told she didn't need anything from me because she got a check from the state," Cummins

Cummins is fighting the adoption, and the case is pending in the Tennessee Court of Criminal Appeals, she said.

Cummins said one of the biggest problems with the child protective service system is the money involved and paid to foster parents and adoptive parents. Foster parents receive hundreds of dollars each month to take a

child into their home, and adoptive parents are allowed to take large tax credits.

"There's a lot of cases of actual abuse going on in the foster care system," she said.

Umoja vendor offers Liberian food to raise money for school

JOHNSON CITY — Handerson Bennah stood behind crock pots full of warm palm butter, fish gravy and potato greens watching for potential customers to pass by at the Umoja Festival. As soon as someone would stop to gaze at the menu or peek inside the large containers of food, the Liberian native would offer a sample. He knows there's a lot of competition between his authentic offerings and the typical festival favorites, but he's looking to draw support for an unfamiliar food and a worldly cause.

"A Taste of Liberia" is part of a fund-raising effort for a nonprofit called BEST— Bennah Empowering through Strategic Training. The proceeds from Umoja Festival sales will go toward improvements to the Henry B. Bennah Kingsville Public School in Liberia, which used to be Bennah's home.

"During the 14-year civil war, my parents were forced out of their home by the rebels and

came to the United States, and the rebels ruined their house," he said. "They destroyed everything and left it in ruins, but we had it renovated, and we converted it into a school to provide an elementary education for these children.'

Since 2007, the Kingsville Public School — located about 23 miles east of the capitol, Monrovia — has been serving about 300 children ages 7-12 in a midsized home. While Bennah's cousin Josephine Francis runs the school, he and his family are in the states trying to generate monetary support for the small facility.

"It's an unselfish deed," Bennah said. "I believe that we as humans exist to do things for others. It's the highest calling anyone can have.'

This is the first year the Bennahs have offered their native cuisine, called soups, at the Umoja Festival. These dishes anything like the American-style chicken noodle or vegetable soup.

"Traditionally, in Liberia, ev-

erything served with a food is soup, but it's really more like a stew."

The mackerel fish and the heart of palm simmered all day to produce a mixture that pours perfectly over rice. Though Liberian foods are typically packed with an array of spices, Bennah said they used a little less to tempt the taste buds of their American customers.

Today they will offer a different menu of jolly rice, fufu and goat soup, plus staples like fried plantains and karla, a fried dough that resembles a hush puppy and can be eaten with sugary and spicy foods. The drink of choice is ginger beer, a non-alcoholic drink that tastes like lemonade.

Since Bennah has retired from Northeast State Community College, where he taught political science, he has turned his focus toward BEST. His biggest aspirations for the nonprofit are to raise enough money to build a new, larger school building and to establish vocational training for those whose educations was disrupted during the civil war.



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What to do after wild week on the stock market

Dow closed up about 1 percent Friday and finished the volatile week down just 1.5 percent. Since the market's highs of April 29, the Dow is down 12 percent. The S&P 500 is down 13.5 percent.

Though history is only a rough guide, Stovall suspects that any coming bear market won't be severe and will end quickly. Bear markets last a year and five months on average.

Stovall is cautiously bullish. He says investors tend to dwell on the recent past when investing in stocks, so they're selling now because they fear a repeat of the 2008 collapse. In the year and a half ending March 9, 2009, stocks dropped 57 percent.

If the financial crisis had happened in 1988, not 2008, it wouldn't be on most people's minds.

"The market is down because people remember getting sucked up in the previous bear market,' Stovall says.

A lot of Wall Street pros say you'd be a fool not to buy stocks now. Prices seem low compared with what stock analysts expect companies to earn this year. But these pros are almost always saying to buy — and almost always too slow to lower their earnings projections when times get tough.

In recent weeks, they've barely touched their projections despite slowing U.S. economic growth and mounting European debt problems. In fact, they expect U.S. companies to make more money than ever this year.

Besides the possibility the pros are too bullish about earnings, there are two major reasons

• Investors fear that Europe's debt crisis could spread to Italy and Spain and lead to big losses at European banks that have lent to the nations that are in trouble.

• In the U.S., the Federal Reserve earlier this week signaled that it would keep interest rates super-low for two more years because of expectations that unemployment will remain high and economic growth slow.

The Fed's decision came after the government said the U.S. economy had barely expanded in the first six months of this year. Fears have grown that the U.S. could fall into a new recession.

Fortunately, the U.S. is in better shape than before the financial crisis in 2008, so stocks may not crater. The financial system is more stable, and the biggest U.S. torical average

companies have amassed an impressive rainy-day fund — \$1 trillion in cash.

Robert Doll, chief equity strategist for money manager BlackRock in New York, doesn't think a recession is likely, but he isn't ruling one out. Still, he's bullish on stocks because so many companies are making money overseas. That means trouble in the U.S. economy matters less to U.S. stocks.

"The U.S. stock market and the U.S. economy are increasingly unrelated," Doll says. "If the U.S. economy is muddling through, the stock market can certainly rise significantly.

Curtis Jensen, chief investment officer of Third Avenue Management, also likes the international exposure of many U.S. companies. His firm, which manages \$15 billion in assets, spent \$210 million on Monday and Tuesday alone scooping

But he adds that he doesn't think the S&P 500 is a bargain only some stocks. "It's not time for the shotgun approach — buying the whole market," he says.

Stocks are cheap using one measure known as the forward price-to-earnings ratio, or forward P/E. For example, if a company is expected to earn \$4 per share over the next year and its stock trades at \$64, the forward P/E is 16. That's roughly the his-

Stocks in the S&P 500 are trading at a forward P/E of about 12, according to research firm Capital IQ. If you believe analyst projections, that suggests stocks are a bargain now. You're paying less for each dollar of expected earnings.

At that price, investors far from retirement age, or those without much savings in stocks, may feel like buying. The problem, says Yale's Shiller, is it's difficult for investors to judge whether to buy by looking at a single year's earnings for companies — much less estimates of a year that hasn't started.

Earnings vary year to year depending on business cycles. So his idea, championed first by investment legend Benjamin Graham in the Depression, is to divide stock prices by their average annual earnings over a decade, adjusted for inflation.

Using that measure, stocks in the S&P 500 are trading at 20 times their earnings — hardly cheap. That's about the average for stock prices over the 50 years, suggesting stock prices now are pretty much where they should be.

Another way of looking at stocks is to compare their prices with Federal Reserve estimates of something called book value – what a company would have left if it had to shut down, sell its assets and pay back its lenders.

Smithers of Smithers & Co., an investing consultancy in London, stocks over the past century have traded at about 0.64 times this measure. Today, the S&P 500 is trading at 0.93 times — suggesting stocks are too expensive. Smithers says he's not buying

"I'd be wary of putting too much in the market," says Shiller. "There's a good chance they'll fall. It's hard to predict the market."

Kitzmiller wrote in his statement to faculty and staff, as recounted in a news release. "We will continue to meet our mission. We have a great staff in place and are doing the right things to improve the lives of our students. We receive guidance and leadership from a great board of education. We have supportive and appreciative relationships with our parents and the Kingsport community.'

Mayor Dennis Phillips said Kitzmiller has fought for the school system and at the same time has been reasonable with taxpayers' money.

"Dr. Kitzmiller has been a real advocate for the city school system. He has been very good to work with as far as the city's concerned, and he will be missed," Phillips said Friday afternoon. "I think it is very critical that the next superintendent be of the same caliber as Dr. Kitzmiller."

Kingsport Assistant Superintendent Damon Cathey has been a finalist but was not chosen in two superintendent searches in Tennessee earlier this year, for the Cleveland and Jackson/Madison County







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Appeals court strikes health insurance requirement

ATLANTA — A federal appeals court panel struck down the centerpiece of President Barack Obama's sweeping health care overhaul Friday, moving the argument over whether Americans can be required to buy health insurance a step closer to the U.S. Supreme Court.

The divided three-judge panel of the 11th Circuit Court of Appeals concluded Congress overstepped its authority when lawmakers passed the so-called individual mandate, the first such decision by a federal appeals court. It's a stinging blow to Obama's signature legislative achievement, as most experts agree the requirement that Americans carry health insurance — or face tax penalties — is the foundation for other parts of the law.

The 207-page opinion, written by Chief Judge Joel Dubina and Circuit Judge Frank Hull, found that lawmakers cannot require residents to "enter into contracts with private insurance companies for the purchase of an expensive product from the time they are born until the time they die."

In a lengthy dissent, Circuit Judge Stanley Marcus accused the majority of ignoring the "undeniable fact that Congress' commerce power has grown exponentially over the past two centuries." He wrote that Congress generally has the constitutional authority to create rules regulating large areas of the national economy.

The White House argued the legislative branch was using a "quintessential" power — its constitutional ability to regulate interstate commerce, including the health care industry — when it passed the overhaul law. Administration officials said they are confident the ruling will not stand. The Justice Department can ask the full 11th Circuit to review the panel's ruling and will also likely appeal to the Supreme Court.

"Individuals who choose to go without health insurance are making an economic decision that affects all of us — when people without insurance obtain health care they cannot pay for, those with insurance and taxpayers are often left to pick up the tab," said White House adviser Stephanie Cutter.

The 11th Circuit's ruling, which sided with 26 states that had sued to stop the law from taking effect, is the latest contradictory judicial opinion on the health care debate. The federal appeals court in Cincinnati upheld the individual mandate in June, and an appeals court in Richmond has heard similar challenges to the law. Several lower court judges have also issued differing opinions on the debate.

Dow finishes wild week on an up note

• NEW YORK — The wildest week on Wall Street since the financial crisis in 2008 ended with a second day of gains. The Dow Jones industrial average finished Friday with a gain of 125 points. Most other times it would have been a fairly big day. By this week's standards, it was a sleeper. Friday capped a week when the blue-chip index had four 400-point swings in a row for the first time in its 115-year history. Trading was frantic across financial markets all week. The yield on the 10-year Treasury note hit a record low. Gold briefly topped \$1,800 per ounce. "It was a sharp and violent week in the stock market, but it's my sense that the worst is over," said Michael Kaufler, a portfolio manager at Federated Investors. The Dow finished Friday with a gain of 125.71 points, or 1.1 percent, to 11,269.02. It finished the week down 1.5 percent after being down as much as 6.3 percent. The broader S&P 500 index rose 6.17 points, or 0.5 percent, to 1,178.81. It finished the week down 1.7 percent.

Jointly produced by the Natural Resources Defense Council, National Wildlife Federation and the UAW, the report, "Supplying Ingenuity: U.S. Suppliers of Clean, Fuel-Efficient Vehicle Technologies," underscores the strong link between fuel-efficient vehicles and economic vitality. According to the report, 43 states and the District of Columbia now are home to the 300-plus manufacturers that develop and supply key components for advanced internal combustion engines and vehicles, hybrid power trains and plug-in electric vehicles. 

Worries about the markets and the economy already seem to have caused some shoppers to pull back. The International Council of Shopping Centers-Goldman Sachs index, which tracks revenue at stores open at least a year, has shown two straight weekly declines.

Claire Sanders Swift, a Washington media consultant, said that after the stock market plunged, she "sent her baby sitter home early and called her broker."

"I keep trying to remind myself we've been through this rodeo before," she said early this week. "The fear is making me not want to spend."

It's a pivotal moment for the nation's retailers. They're in the midst of back-to-school season and are planning for Christmas sales. Together, the two shopping seasons represent up to half their annual revenue.

Retailers are concerned that the weak economy and stock market turmoil could cause shoppers to retreat as they did when the financial crisis hit in 2008. Back then, spending plunged so much that some retailers slashed prices end dragged the market down up to 80 percent just to draw just 1.5 percent after it had plumshoppers to stores. Others sold

jewelry and clothing to liquidators for pennies on the dollar. Some went out of business.

This time, retailers seem better prepared. They've kept inventories lean to avoid being stuck with huge piles of marked-down products.

Jeff Landis of Chicago-based Montopoli Custom Clothiers said because business has been quiet the past few weeks, he's decided to delay stocking up on fabric for custom suits for fall. And Geoff Stern, owner of Toy Professor, a toy store in Summit, N.J., said sales this week were down about 25 percent from a typical August week.

Until late this week, a batch of poor economic data and a gloomy outlook from the Federal Reserve set off fears that the economy might be about to slide into another recession. That threat appears to have diminished. But it's hardly gone away.

Still overhanging the financial markets and the U.S. economy is concern that Europe's debt crisis will spread through the U.S. financial system. Investors worry that Italy and Spain, two of Europe's biggest economies, might be unable to pay all their debts.

If they couldn't, big European banks that hold huge amounts of government debt would be at risk of failure. That possibility, in turn, could harm many large U.S. banks with close relationships with their European counter-

The mildly positive economic figures in recent days have at least given economists cause for hope. Layoffs are down. Retail sales are up. Gas prices have fallen. Employers added 117,000 jobs last month. That isn't enough to significantly lower the unemployment rate, now at 9.1 percent. But it was more than expected and was an improvement after two dismal months for hiring.

Retail sales rose 0.5 percent last month, the Commerce Department said Friday. It was the best showing since March. The government also revised up its estimates of sales for the previous two months. Even after excluding gas station sales, which were boosted by a rise in gas prices, sales rose 0.3 percent in July.

PARIS — The French government was put under further pressure to cut deeper into spending after figures Friday showed growth in Europe's second biggest economy ground to a halt in the spring, in another sign that the global economy is facing rising recessionary threats.

With the worse-than-expected French growth figures suggesting a possible budget shortfall this year, government ministers may have to find additional savings ahead of a key meeting with President Nicolas Sarkozy on Aug. 24.

The flat growth reported in the second quarter of the year was attributable to a slump in consumer spending and exports, and came as policymakers scramble to soothe investor concerns that the country could be the next major economy to lose its coveted triple-A credit rating.

A move Friday by stock market regulators in France and elsewhere across Europe to ban short

selling — a form of stock market speculation that some are blaming for the turbulent trading in recent days — looked to be having some impact.

But economists stressed that any rebound was very fragile, and some derided the ban as misguided and ineffective.

French bank shares were performing solidly in Paris, with Societe Generale up nearly 5.7 percent and Credit Agricole up over 2 percent at the close of trading Friday. Over the past couple of days, French bank stocks,

and Societe Generale in particular, have been hugely volatile amid rumors of their financial health.

The head of the French stock market regulator, the AMF, Jean-Pierre Jouyet, meanwhile, said on RTL radio that an investigation was opened Friday into the origin of the rumors targeting Societe Generale.

The AMF announced plans for the probe Wednesday after shares in Societe Generale plummeted, closing 14.7 percent lower that day.

Wall Street's ride compounds states' pension fears

ALBANY, N.Y. — Wall Street's volatility has hit state pension funds just as they were beginning to recover from the recession, turning what was merely a troubled forecast into a potentially stormy future for taxpayers who are on the hook for billions in unfunded liabilities for government

As for the millions of government clerks, engineers, janitors, teachers and firefighters in the retirement systems, they are protected by law or, as in New York, by the state constitution, to be backed up by tax dollars if necessary. Their benefits remain safe for life in guaranteed "defined benefit" pension plans that are disappearing in the private sector, where most employees are left to fend for themselves with 401(k) plans that they mostly or entirely fund themselves.

California's main public-employee pension fund, the nation's largest, has lost at least \$18 billion off its stock portfolio since July 1, about 7.5 percent of its \$237.5 billion total asset value on

E.J. McMahon, a senior fellow at the conservative Manhattan Institute for Policy Research, said the asset levels of virtually all public pension funds are below 2007 levels despite the recovery of the market in 2009 and 2010.

"They still think there is a 'long-term norm," he said of fund managers. "The events of the last two months are a reminder of how wrong that might be.

As recently as last month, California's two public pension funds reported investment gains of more than 20 percent for the fiscal year ended June 30, largely driven by rising stock values.

The increase came as both funds - one for teachers, the other for state and local government workers — were clawing their way back from losses in 2008 and 2009 that cost them up to one-third of their asset value.

The recent losses are stoking fears again that taxpayers will have to bail them out at the expense of other programs that already have been subject to deep budget cuts. The state already faces an estimated \$75 billion in unfunded public pension liabili-

Washington, Scott counties get disaster area tag from April storms



The Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (VDACS) announced today that Washington County has received U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) designation as a primary disaster area due to damage and losses caused by severe storms with high winds, hail and tornadoes that occurred on April 27 and 28. Grayson, Russell, Scott and Smith counties and the city of Bristol received contiguous disaster declarations, meaning they border a county named as a primary dis-

A federal Secretarial disaster designation rity available and repayment ability. SURE makes farm operators in both primary and contiguous counties eligible to be considered for assistance from the federal Farm Service Agency (FSA), provided eligibility requirements are met. This assistance includes FSA emergency loans and the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments Program known as

Farmers in eligible counties have eight months from the date of a Secretarial disaster declaration to apply for emergency loan assistance. FSA will consider each emergency loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of production losses, secuProgram applications for 2011 crop losses will be accepted in 2012 when the 2011 farm revenue data required by law become available. Local FSA offices can provide farmers with additional information.

Matthew J. Lohr, VDACS commissioner, said, "I am grateful that the USDA has declared Washington County to be a disaster area eligible for federal assistance, and that other localities have been designated as contiguous disaster areas. These areas were very hard hit by tornadoes and storms last April and any assistance farmers can get will be appreciated."

UT Gardens August Plant of the Month is 'Franky Boy'

I love conifers of every shape, size, and color. They provide year-round interest and most are low-maintenance, typically care-free plants.

One selection I find especially attractive is "Franky Boy" oriental arborvitae (Platycladus orientalis "Franky Boy" [syn Thuja orientalis]).

The first thing that I find appealing about this plant is its fine foliage texture. It's like no other arborvitae I've seen before. Unique strands of thread-like foliage are strikingly unusual for the way in which they grow upright when they appear as though they would naturally weep in a downward fashion.

This growth habit creates a wonderful, dwarf conifer with an overall plant form of a tear drop. Add its unique foliage habit to its bright chartreuse color — which turns bronzy-orange in the winter — and you have a winning year-round plant. It is not required, but pruning can create a tighter, more dense form.

This unique member of the cupressaceae or cypress family

comes from Holland and just hit the United States market a few years ago. I'm just now starting to see it available from mail order or specialty nurseries, and in my opinion it is a plant well worth seeking out. The year-round color and unique foliage texture set this evergreen apart from all oth-

How to Grow: Franky Boy thrives in full sun to part shade. A moist, well-drained soil is ideal, but it is tolerant of dry sites. Oriental arborvitae is cold hardy to zone 5 (-20°F to 15°F). It will mature to 4 feet tall and 3 feet wide.

Landscape Use: Franky Boy is an evergreen that can be used in a variety of ways in the garden. It's a great size plant for use in decorative containers or in the middle or foreground of foundation plantings or landscapes. To really make it pop, pair it with plants that have contrasting color and texture such as Canna "Australia," Ensete ventricosum (Red Abyssinian Banana) or Heuchera "Obsidian.'

Grants available to help Tennessee agribusiness grow

NASHVILLE — Funds are now available for some of Tennessee's agriculture-related businesses through the Southern United States Trade Association (SUSTA). The federal Market Access Program (M.A.P.) for Branded Products helps new exporters develop foreign markets by reimbursing qualifying companies for up to 50 percent of their eligible expenses.

The term "branded" refers to products with a brand name, as opposed to raw agricultural commodities.

SUSTA will accept the applications for the 2012 M.A.P. Branded Program. The program is designed specifically to help small agriculture companies enter export markets by matching marketing costs that include advertising, exhibiting at trade shows and changes to packaging and la-

According to Kyle Holmberg, international marketing specialist for the Tennessee Department of Agriculture, hundreds of companies already use these resources and are growing their businesses despite the slow economic recovery.

"This is a great program that really helps Tennessee agriculture companies interested in exporting or marketing products overseas," said Holmberg. "The program also mitigates some of the risk in an economic climate that has most businesses looking for other options."

Agricultural product growers, food producers, distributors and manufacturers can use the M.A.P. program. To be eligible for the program, companies must be considered small according to U.S. Small Administration Business (SBA) standards, have yearly sales of at least \$100,000, and promote a brand-name product that has at least 50 percent U.S. agricultural origin. M.A.P. Branded is funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Foreign Agricultural Service (FAS) and administered to southern U.S. companies by SUSTA. Companies located in any of SUSTA's member states can apply for funding.

M.A.P. can provide funding for direct promotional expenses, advertising, point-of-sale materials, temporary in-store

U.S. farms grow version of pricey Japanese Kobe beef

CAZENOVIA, N.Y. — Half a world away from the secretive farms that produce Japan's legendary Kobe beef, Jerry Wilson raises the American version of the meat that will become \$50 steaks and

The chocolaty brown cattle at Wilson's Meadows Farm don't technically produce Kobe beef — that term is reserved for the Japanese super high-end cut famous for its succulent taste and eye-popping prices. Wilson calls his meat "American Style Kobe Beef." Other ranchers use similar names like "Kobe-style beef" or "wagyu beef," a reference to the breed

Whatever the name, domestic production of the pricey product has grown from

practically nothing a dozen years ago to a flourishing boutique niche, with recent growth fueled in part by a ban on Japanese beef because of reports of foot-and-mouth disease. While American ranchers might not be able to match the mystique of Japanese Kobe and much of the domestic product is cross-bred, they say their product compares to the legendarily luscious stuff.

"We can get through any door we said Wilson, watching his

high-priced herd crowd a bucket of barley dumped on the ground. "All we have to do is a taste test."

Kobe is to beef what a Maserati is to sports cars: the epitome of pricey, exclusive luxury item. Steaks can retail for more than \$100 at high-end restaurants and specialty stores. Don't look for it plastic-wrapped in the meat aisle of your local supermarket.

True Kobe beef comes from wagyu cattle raised in the Hyogo prefecture of Japan, where Kobe is the capital city. Japanese ranchers are notoriously secretive about their techniques, giving rise to stories that they ply their small herds with beer (to stimulate appetite in hot weather) and have sake massaged into their skin (thought to stimulate mus-

Kobe is fatty, but not in a bad way. The

thin veins are laced in so uniformly that cuts really do look like marble. Wagyu meat has a higher proportion of unsaturated fat—the "good" kind of fat—when compared to meats from other breeds. It's the fat that helps give the beef a flavor and mouth melt that sends tasters to the thesaurus in search of adjectives like

velvety, scrumptious, silky and savory. "You mention fat and it's like saying 'rat poison.' We've been conditioned to believe that all fat that you eat is bad. And that's simply not true, especially with wagvu," said Robert Estrin, co-owner of Lone Mountain Ranch Cattle Co. in Golden, N.M. Estrin raises "full blood" or 100 percent wagvu cattle.

There are about 150 U.S. producers in the American Wagyu Association, many of them with 25 head or less, said Michael Beattie, executive director of

the industry group. The largest, Boise, Idaho-based Snake River Farms, slaughters 10,000 to 15,000 head of wagyu a year — a very thin slice of total annual U.S. commercial slaughter of around 34 mil-Snake River's Jay Theiler said their

wagyu business is growing about 20 percent a year, with growth coming not only from steaks, but from hamburger, hot dog and barbecue meat.

"It's very small here," Beattie said of the wagyu business. "But the potential for this breed to grow is huge.'

U.S. officials stopped the import of meat from Japan last year after the foot-and-mouth disease reports. So connoisseurs dropping \$145 for a pair of 12-ounce wagyu rib-eyes are likely purchasing from a domestic producer or from Australia.



Don't miss Mother Nature's free fireworks extravaganza

What if you could take in a fireworks show — without the mess and noise — from the comfort of your own backyard? If the weather cooperates, just look skyward tonight for a phenomenon known as the Perseid meteor shower.

Meteor showers are named by the constellation from which meteors appear to fall, a spot in the sky astronomers call the radiant. The Perseid meteor shower is so named because meteors appear to fall from a point in the constellation Perseus.

The distinctive shooting stars — courtesy of the outskirts of a debris cloud from the comet known as Swift-Tuttle — are fun to watch as the bits of ice and dust hit the Earth's upper atmosphere, ignite and streak across the night sky.

Astronomers agree sky conditions for this year's show are somewhat more limited than last year, since a full moon will likely wipe out fainter meteors from view.

Nevertheless, this is a celestial show that you shouldn't miss. If clouds aren't in the way, the shower should be particularly visible tonight because of a filament of dust drifting across Earth's orbit. As astronomical phenomena go, this filament is relatively young, having boiled off Swift-Tuttle as recently as the Civil War.

Beginning at 11 p.m. or so and continuing through early morning, sky watchers can expect to see dozens of meteors per

It was in the midst of the Civil War, in 1862, that two Americans, Lewis Swift and Horace Tuttle, working independently, discovered the comet that bears their name and is responsible for the magnificent celestial show every August at this time.

However, the Perseid meteor showers were observed as far back as 2,000 years ago, and in ancient Europe, the Perseid meteor shower was known as the "Tears of St. Lawrence."

Viewing the Perseids doesn't require any high-powered equipment, although some folks prefer to use binoculars or telescopes to get a better look. It's an activity that the whole family can participate in, free of charge, and the only downside is

Although city lights can reduce viewing to some extent, the shower will light up darker skies. Especially fun to watch are the so-called Earthgrazers that streak horizontally through the atmosphere. These slow and colorful meteoroids tend to be brighter, and therefore more visible, even in less than perfect viewing conditions.

Needless to say, the best spots for viewing are those which are well away from artificial sources of light, such as streetlights or car headlights, that can ruin your sensitive night vision. If you can see each star of the Little Dipper, your eyes have "dark adapted," and your chosen position is a good one. Under these conditions, you should be able to see plenty of meteors.

Once you have found such a spot, either lie back or position yourself so that the horizon appears at the edge of your peripheral vision, with the stars and sky filling your field of view. Meteors will instantly grab your attention as they streak by.

The best known of all meteor showers, the Perseid never fails to put on a good show. So turn off the boob tube and go outside for an evening of unmatched entertainment that everyone can enjoy.

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As trending goes, Sarah Palin isn't

NEW YORK – The latest trend in the media world is "trending." That is, monitoring what people are buzzing about and directing coverage accordingly.

Just as the unspoken sometimes reveals more than the spoken, what's not trending suggests more than what's trending. In all the many thousands of words written in the immediate aftermath of the Republican debate in Iowa, two words were scarce: Sarah Palin.

But she wasn't even in Iowa during the debate, you say. Correct. Her "bus tour," idling since its last attempt to seize national attention, wasn't due to arrive in Iowa until Friday. Then again, Texas Gov. Rick Perry wasn't in Iowa either, and his name was everywhere. Some political observers even dubbed him winner of the debate in absentia.

This isn't to say Palin doesn't still have a loyal following. According to a recent survey by RealClearPolitics, which averages the results of several national polls, Palin ranked third behind Perry in second place and Mitt Romney in first. Palin barely edged out Michele Bachmann in fourth place by just two-tenths of a point.

It is to say, however, that she was not then on the minds of

Despite her persistence as a hypothetical presidential contender in polls, could it be that Sarah Palin's moment is up? Has she (finally) exploited "McCain's Folly" to the ex-

Palin may still have a "fire in my belly," as she recently told Fox's Greta Van Susteren, but does America still have an appetite for Palin's brand of politicking? Her months-long tease about whether she'll run for president may be a savvy move if you're selling books and cutting TV deals, but it's not much in the way of leadership.

Eventually, when a tease goes on too long, fascination morphs into boredom. Or anger. The authenticity that Palin displayed in her early days as mayor of Wasilla and governor of Alaska has lost is luster from overexposure. Authenticity becomes inauthentic once it is commodified and packaged as a marketing strategy.

There has never been any debate about Palin's considerable star power. Full of personality and chutzpah, she gets credit for putting relative unknowns on the political map and for raising mountains of cash with a wink and the sort of fiery rhetoric that gets blood rushing to the amygdala. (That's the section of the brain that relates to pleasure and

pain for those of you who leapt to the wrong body part, if the right conclusion.)

But star power isn't enough, as we're witnessing in real time. President Obama beat the stars when he rose from community organizer and state senator to become U.S. senator before running for president. The tides haven't risen as hoped, but the walls do seem to be tumbling down. With dismal news from London's riots to wildly fluctuating global markets, this is no time for unserious, self-infatuated (maybe, winky) candi-

While serious candidates were prepping for the hard work of a presidential debate, Palin was announcing her intention to pop over to Iowa in her "One Nation Tour." In an e-mail to her fans, she wrote: "The heartland is perfect territory for more of the One Nation Tour as we put forth efforts to revitalize the fundamental restoration of America by highlighting our nation's heart, history, and founding principles." (Homeland Security reportedly has sought help from idle bloggers fluent in Palinspeak to translate the meaning of this sentence.)

Good luck with that. Palin's governing theory reads like a copy editor's game where you stitch together random phrases to create something like sense. Her sashay into Iowa, meanwhile — showing up basically to show up — is testament to her inability to resist the spotlight. Or perhaps it is

Time will tell, but what recent history already confirms is that Palin isn't a serious person. If she had been serious about running for president, she would have completed her term as governor. Or, having left office, she would have spent her time hitting the books and filling in knowledge gaps so painfully exposed during the 2008 election.

Instead, she hit the road in a series of moneymaking, self-promoting stunts and has succeeded in achieving the true American dream: fame and fortune. Good for her. But all those people who have written checks and invested good faith in their chosen one will be justified in feeling played like any other heartbroken victim of a terrible flirt.

New visa policies will be good for economy

The fight in Congress over immigration reform sometimes feels intractable. Democrats are nominally for big changes. Yet in 2009-10, when Democrats controlled the House, the Senate and the White House, sweeping changes didn't advance for reasons that still aren't fully clear.

Meanwhile. Republicans are nominally strongly against illegal immigrants. Yet some of their key allies, starting with the Chamber of Commerce and other business groups, like the cheap labor provided by these immigrants.

Thankfully, the Obama administration has figured out a way to make significant changes in a key area of immigration without needing to get congressional blessings. Last week, the administration unveiled a plan to change visa policies to make it much easier to attract "foreign entrepreneurial talent of exceptional ability."

In a telephone interview with editorial writers and other journalists from around the world, Alejandro Mayorkas, chief of U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services, said the Obama administration saw making temporary

work visas and green cards more available to proven job-creators as a smart way to help the U.S. economy. The changes will allow some foreign entrepreneurs to receive H-1B visas given to foreign workers with specialized skills — if they can demonstrate a viable plan for a start-up business that makes products or provides services that are in the U.S. national interest.

This is the sort of constructive change that high-tech executives, from Bill Gates on down, have sought for years....

A proposed corporate merger between AT&T and T-Mobile could help bring many new technologies and opportunities to Southwestern Virginians.

Upon approval of the merger by the Federal Communications Commission, AT&T has pledged to bring billions of dollars of new investment to bear to deploy state-of-the-art broadband telecommunications networks throughout rural areas of America, including Southwestern Virginia.

Stronger, faster and more reliable Internet and wireless services will begin to place our mountainous region on par with urban areas like Northern Virginia and Hampton Roads, which enjoy a high level of service now, and provide a long list of benefits for business, education, and government services that comes with expanded telecommunications networks and wireless access.

Nearly 15 years ago when Internet applications were in their infancy, I started working as the Wise County and Norton city clerk of Circuit Court. Over these years, the clerk of court office has spearheaded numerous cutting-edge information technology applications to enhance judicial productivity ranging from online subscriber access to real estate records and GIS maps a decade ago to attorney remote access to court case files and

documents. Fortunately, the endeavors have been professional successes because of the adaptation of local attorneys to the higher productivity tools. Over the years, the

electronic filing of

clerk of court office has received numerous bipartisan accolades from state governors, state and na-

tional legal and technology groups, and others because we have been ambitious and determined to employ modern information technology into the judicial administration workflow. Many new information technology applications are on our drawing board to continue to keep Wise County's judicial administration in the vanguard of productivity and workflow enhancement change.

Nevertheless, to my dismay, Wise County remains behind the modern information technology curve. The fact of the matter is that deployment of information technology for wireless broadband and advanced cellular services is not a high priority with most telecommunications carriers today operating within the regional marketplace. This is best evidenced by the years of struggle to gain any cellular services in and around the town of Appalachia and many others throughout the mountain region.

With the approval of the AT&T and T-Mobile corporate structures, the market dynamic is almost certain to change for the better. AT&T expects to add one million square miles of America to the national broadband infrastructure network, reaching 97 percent of the American population, including those in rural areas like our own.

The benefits for business growth, education learning enhancement, and government service using wireless broadband applications within the region will be astronomical with deployed modern telecommunications infrastructure. There will no longer be a diminished quality of life based upon outdated and frequently awkward dropped signals from one place to the next along our highways. Business leaders and tourists coming to the mountains will no longer feel the inferior lack of modern broadband communications.

The proposed merger will positively transform nearly all of the nation's rural communities with high-quality wireless broadband without a vote of federal or state legislators in Washington or Richmond. Approval of the merger by the Federal Communication Commission will enable areas like ours to reap the powerful benefits almost immediately.

For example, consider the additional competitive edge that Southwestern Virginia may gain over our neighbors to the north in West Virginia who face similar challenges of mountainous terrain, a job-starved economy, and youthful generations departing for opportunities. Virginia immediately, as opposed to West Virginia, would recognize FCC approval of the AT&T and T-Mobile merger. Southwestern Virginia would rise on the economic competitiveness index.

In addition, business investment within the region may abruptly become more attractive because of the improved telecommunications infrastructure offered by the AT&T and T-Mobile merger. High-quality broadband wireless is essential to modern day business practices. Business location decisions more and more frequently turn on broadband wireless access in the 21st century.

In making the case for readers to involve themselves in the AT&T and T-Mobile merger consideration pending before the FCC, expert observers note that the two telecommunications firms are a good fit for a merger because their respective spectrum positions make for rapid network integration and enhanced efficiencies. The merger will most likely serve as an industry catalyst, because it will raise the quality of service and force rival telecommunication providers to concentrate on expanding their broadband wireless networks in rural areas.

With five major telecommunications providers nationwide, and many smaller providers, the telecommunications industry as a whole will only become more competitive. Competition leads to lower prices and better services for consumers. Southwestern Virginians have long been in a wireless telecommunications monopoly. We face a significant market change with FCC approval of the AT&T and T-Mobile merger.

If the deal proceeds, as now envisioned, the arrival of higher quality mobile Internet will enable remarkable change throughout Southwestern Virginia. Therefore, I urge business and civic groups, county and municipal governments, and private citizens to communicate support for approval of the AT&T and T-Mobile merger to the Federal Communications Commission and the Virginia congressional delegation.

Hatfield stuck to his principles


Mark Hatfield, 89, who died last weekend in his native Oregon, was the first Christian politician I recall meeting in Washington, which is to say he did more than keep a Bible on his desk. He sought to keep its words and teachings and its main "character" in his heart.

When we first met in the early 70s I was in the middle of my own "faith journey," trying to sort out what Scripture teaches about this world and the next and to see if it could match my conservative political leanings.

Hatfield suggested to me that the two kingdoms (of God and of the world) sometimes intersect, but more often diverge. He was criticized by some political conservatives for aligning himself with liberal Democratic Sen. George McGovern against the war in Vietnam. The McGovern-Hatfield Amendment, had it passed, would have set a deadline for the end of U.S. military operations in South Vietnam. McGovern-Hatfield became "the most outstanding defiance of executive power regarding the war prior to 1971," writes Wikipedia.

That defiance is repeated today in debates over wars in Afghanistan, Iraq and Libya and the use of U.S. military might around the world.

Hatfield and McGovern were right about Vietnam. The reason more of us didn't recognize it at the time was that proponents of the war (most of whom didn't fight it) wrapped themselves in the flag and treated any criticism of Presidents Johnson and Nixon and their prosecution of the war as

unpatriotic. Sound familiar? In 1981, af-

tion to chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee, I met with him in his upgraded office. This when what

was known as the "Religious Right" was flexing its muscles in the aftermath of Ronald Reagan's victory and the defeat of five liberal Democratic senators, including McGovern.

Hatfield told me he had been through the religious wars before. He mentioned the Scofield Reference Bible, which to many self-identified fundamentalist Christians was the only "true" and reliable translation. Some regarded any other translation as "heretical." Hatfield thought it more important to apply the teachings of Jesus, rather than argue about "jots and tittles."

Hatfield wasn't perfect. He was the target of two ethics investigations. One involved his wife, Antoinette. In 1984, Mrs. Hatfield, a realtor, received \$55,000 in fees from Basil Tsakos, a Greek financier, "while Hatfield was promoting Tsakos' trans-Africa pipeline proposal," Salon.com reports. "Hatfield denied wrongdo-The Hatfields apologized and donated the money to charity. And in 1992, Hatfield, writes the Washington Post, "was formally rebuked by the Senate ethics

committee for not disclosing more than \$42,000 in gifts from friends and lobbyists." He apologized again and was later cleared ter his elevaof the charges. Mostly, though, Hatfield lived up to the "St. Mark" label applied to him by his

> Hatfield was thought of as a consistent "pro-lifer." He opposed abortion (though he never worked to limit it), the death penalty and war. In 1982, he told the Christian Science Monitor, "There is to me a direct ratio between the increase of our arsenals and the diminishing sense of national security. There comes a time in a nation's life when additional money spent for rockets and bombs, far from strengthening national security, will actually weaken national security — when there are people who are hungry and not fed, people who are cold and not clothed." That last line is straight from the teachings of Je-

> Some of his fellow Christians may not have always agreed with Mark Hatfield, but they couldn't accuse him of hypocrisy. He consistently lived by the standards he professed and challenged others to do the same.

Though we may have disagreed on some political issues, our common faith kept us close. In the end that is all that really mattered — to Mark Hatfield and

U.S. copter crash sends a message

The deaths of 30 Americans, 22 of them highly trained Navy SEALs, in a fiery helicopter crash last week in Afghanistan has joltingly reminded this country that its debt crisis isn't the only problem seeking an elusive solution.

Multiple deaths of this magnitude have become a rarity in the Afghanistan war, which allows most Americans to go about their days without thinking much about the fight unless they know someone among the deployed.

Petty Officer First Class Michael J. Strange was constantly on the minds of his family and friends. Unfortunately, Philadelphia native was one of the SEALs killed when their Chinook went down. "He wasn't supposed to die this young," Elizabeth Strange said of her 25-year-old son.


The Taliban claims it shot down the chopper using a shoulder-fired rocket, but the crash was still being investigated. Knowing the exact cause won't lessen the grief of Strange's family. But the crash has reinvigorated discussion of the best course to continue the war - counterinsurgency or counterterrorism.

Former Afghanistan commander Gen. David Petraeus favored the three-pronged counterinsurgency tactics that proved successful for him in Iraq — protect the people, bolster the government, build up the police and army.

But Petraeus admits such an effort is hard and takes time, and after 10 years of fighting in Afghanistan, the American public has about run out of patience to stay that course. Especially when the Afghan government, which is as inept as it is corrupt, seems unlikely to ever engender the public confidence needed to make it self-supporting.

There has been speculation that Petraeus' departure also signals a switch to a counterrorism approach in which known terrorist havens are attacked in raids such as the one that took out al-Qaeda leader Osama bin Laden.

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

The everyday blocking drill wasn't exactly must-see TV, but it had the attention of coach Derek Dooley, who barked instructions TENNESSEE DILB

at UT's three tight ends as he engrossed himself in the exercise.

It was clear he had the group's full attention.

"Coach Dooley coached tight ends in the NFL," said junior starter Mychal Rivera, referring to Dooley's two years under Nick Saban with the Miami Dolphins. "Anytime he comes over there, your ears perk up a little bit."

Dooley was with the tight ends for an extended period of time Thursday, Rivera said. After a scrimmage in which Rivera nabbed just one pass for 6 yards, freshmen Brendan Downs and Cameron Clear went without a catch and the offense, as a whole, struggled to generate consistent yards on the ground, the unit had plenty of work to do.

"Tight end's a hard position in

our offense," Dooley said. "You have to probably understand conceptually the offense better than any player except the quarterback. You've got to understand the run game schematics, you've got to understand the protection schemes like a running back and you've got to understand the routes concepts like a receiver.

"We put a lot on the tight end, and it's hard on them. They're

Early exit: Woods misses cut at PGA

JOHNS CREEK, Ga. — Hardly anyone knows the two guys leading the PGA Championship.

No one even recognized Tiger Woods.

Once identified by either his No. 1 ranking or his 14 majors, Woods missed the cut Friday at Atlanta Athletic Club with a performance that was even more shocking because of the numbers he compiled.

He hit into 22 bunkers. He put four



balls in the water. His five double bogeys were the most he ever made in one tourna-

With one final bo-

gey for a 3-over 73, Woods finished out of the top 100 for the first time ever in a major. He was 15 shots behind Jason Dufner, who has never won a PGA Tour event, and Keegan Bradley, playing in his first major.

"I got some time off again," said Woods, who doesn't expect to tee it up

again until the Australian Open in November.

Based on the last two days, he has a lot of work to do.

Dufner, who hasn't made a cut since the last week in May, holed a 25-foot eagle putt on the fifth hole and threw in five birdies for a 5-under 65 that put him atop the leader-board for the first time in a major. Bradley, a tour rookie and the nephew of LPGA great Pat Bradley, did even better with a bogey-free round of 64.



SPRINGFIELD, Mass. — Recognized for his basketball talents, Dennis Rodman instead talked about his personal shortcomings.

He hasn't been a very good husband or father. His relationship with his mother has been strained.

But he had four men he could turn to no matter how hard times got.

Choking up often during an emotional speech, Rodman was enshrined in the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame on Friday night, giving a look at what's underneath all the tattoos and

outrageous outfits that he became as famous for as anything he did on the court.

"I didn't play the game for the money, I didn't play the game to be famous," he said. "What you see here is more just an illusion that I love to just be an individual that's very colorful."

Arriving at Symphony Hall in a gray suit, feather-lined cowboy hat and giant white sunglasses, he changed into another outfit for his speech, a red scarf and black jacket commemorating the Pistons and Bulls, the teams he helped win five NBA championships.

He thanked Commissioner David Stern and the NBA community "to even just have me in the building" and saved his deepest appreciation for coaches Phil Jackson and Chuck Daly, Lakers owner Jerry Buss, and James Rich, whose family took Rodman in after his mother threw him out of the house.

Rodman described them as "a mentor, a father, somebody you can look up to and call any time of day" who ignored his antics and "looked at an individual that had a good heart." His own father left when he was young and they never reconciled.

The enshrinement of the flamboyant rebounding and defensive specialist capped the enshrinement of the 10-member class of 2011. Chris Mullin,

the two-time Olympic gold medalist, opened the night as the other headliner.

The class also included coaches Tara VanDerveer, who has led Stanford to two national titles and won more than 800 games, Tex Winter and Division II Philadelphia University coach Herb Magee, the career leader at the collegiate level with more than 900 wins.

Amid SEC rumors, Texas A&M regents call meeting on conference alignment

HOUSTON — The Texas A&M System board of regents has called a special meeting Monday that includes an agenda item about conference alignment. The session comes amid speculation that Texas A&M is leaving the Big 12 for the Southeastern Conference.

The item, part of the executive session agenda, is called: "Authorization for the President to Take All Actions Relating to Texas A&M University's Athletic Conference Alignment, The Texas A&M University System."

Texas A&M considered switching to the SEC last year before staying in the Big 12. The university hasn't confirmed it is again discussing a jump to the SEC, but talk has been intensifying that the Aggies are looking to leave.

The news of the meeting comes on the heels of the Texas House Committee on Higher Education calling a Tuesday hearing, to which Big 12, SEC and Texas A&M officials have been invited, to discuss possible realignment of college conferences in the state.

Florida State is another school that has been mentioned as a potential new addition to the SEC. But university President Eric Barron said he hasn't had any talks about his school leaving the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Aggie internet message boards and blogs are lighting up with chatter about such a move and several posts on Friday said that students chanted: "SEC! SEC!" as university President R. Bowen Loftin walked to the podium at Texas A&M commencement cere-

Such a move could jeopardize the future of the Big 12 and has state legislators concerned. The Higher Education committee said Commissioners Dan Beebe of the Big 12 and Mike Slive of the SEC have been invited to testify, as have Loftin and A&M system board of regents Chairman Richard

There was speculation that administrators from other schools in the Big 12, who would be affected by such a move, would be invited to the heading as well, but they were not included on the list.

"They have not called me

and I'm not volunteering," Texas Tech President Guy Bailey said.

Beebe declined an interview request by The Associated Press to discuss a possible move by Texas A&M on Fri-

Texas A&M won't confirm that it is in discussions with the SEC, but Texas Gov. Rick Perry, a Texas A&M graduate, told The Dallas Morning News this week that as far as he knows "conversations are being had" on the subject.

A&M athletic director Bill Byrne, who is out of the country traveling with the men's basketball team, declined comment on the subject through a spokesman. The only official word from A&M came in a statement released by Loftin on Wednesday.

"President Loftin is committed to doing what is best for Texas A&M not only now, but also into the future," the statement read. "We continue to have wide-ranging conversations regarding all aspects of the university, including both academics and athletics.'

An SEC spokesman declined comment on the situation, but did say that Slive would not be meeting with Perry on Friday while the governor was in Birmingham, Ala. for a fundraiser.

The Big 12 looked to be in trouble last summer when Nebraska and Colorado left the conference and several other schools were courted by the Pac-10. Texas decided to stay in the Big 12 which made it much easier for Oklahoma, Texas A&M and Oklahoma State to remain as well.

At that time Loftin issued a letter addressed to "The Aggie Family" on A&M's decision to remain in the Big 12.

In the letter he said by remaining a member of the Big 12: "We were able to more than double our financial return to the levels being offered by other conferences."

One possible reason for Texas A&M's renewed interest in leaving the Big 12 could be because the school isn't happy about The Longhorn Network — created through a 20-year,

Texas A&M has a rabid fan base and many were upset when the school decided to remain in the Big 12, and are miffed their archrival has its own network.

FSU president: talk of league switch baseless

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Florida State University President Eric Barron said Friday he's heard the rumors that the Seminoles are moving to the Southeastern Conference and said that's all they are at the moment — rumors.

But Barron also didn't say never, referring to the reports as "quite fascinating."

"I don't think there is anything to talk about right now," Barron said. "I don't speculate when there's no conversation."

Florida State has largely dominated the Atlantic Coast Conference in football since joining the conference two decades ago, winning a dozen league titles and two national championships since.

ACC Commissioner John Swofford said Friday he's heard nothing from any of the conference schools being contacted by other leagues.

"We'll continue to be mindful of the collegiate landscape and what's best for the ACC and its member institutions," Swofford said i a statement from his office. "With that said, I've received no indication from any of our 12 presidents that they have any intention of being affiliated with any conference other than the ACC."

Barron said he's not had any talks about Florida State bolting the ACC, calling it "a good conference."

Florida State athletic director Randy Spetman was out of town and unavailable to comment on the reports.

SEC spokesman Charles Bloom declined to comment on expansion rumors swirling around Texas A&M and Florida State.

"There's no offer on the table," Seminoles coach Jimbo Fisher said after practice on Friday. "I have not spoken to anybody about it. We love the ACC. We love the conference we're in.'

University of Florida President Bernie Machen and athletic director Jeremy Foley also declined comment, school spokesman Steve Orlando

Although wooed by the SEC more than 20 years ago, Florida State became the ninth member of the ACC when it formally joined the league on 1, 1991, beginning its football membership in the 1992 season. The conference is now comprised of a dozen teams with the addition of Boston College, Miami and Virginia Tech in 2004.

Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, and Wake Forest were charter members in 1953 with Virginia coming into the league later that year followed by Georgia Tech in 1978 and Florida State in 1991.

NCAA hears Ohio State violations case

INDIANAPOLIS — Ohio State has made it through its meeting with the NCAA committee on infractions. Now the Buckeyes have to play the 2011 season knowing that just before their annual showdown against rival Michigan, they could get slapped with a bowl ban.

School officials appeared Friday before the infractions committee, which heard how players received improper benefits from a tattoo-shop owner and how ex-coach Jim Tressel learned of those NCAA violations and covered them up. The bottom line: Tressel used players throughout the 2010 season he knew were ineligible.

"We look forward to the committee's report in eight to 12 weeks," athletic director Gene Smith said in a statement afterward. Most such decisions are rendered in six to eight

If it takes three months, that would mean Ohio State will receive word on penalties in the second week of November — shortly before the Buckeyes travel to Ann Arbor for their annual all-or-nothing game with Michigan on Nov. 26.

Friday's meeting took only four hours, with the 10-member committee not even breaking for lunch. That could be a sign the panel, chaired by Mideastern Athletic Conference Commissioner Dennis Thomas, had few questions and largely accepted Ohio State's version of events after months of investigation.

The school also announced it will repay the \$338,811 it received for playing in the Sugar Bowl, a 31-26 victory over Arkansas. Previously, Smith had said Ohio State's proposed sanctions — the departure of Tressel, player



suspensions, vacating the 2010 season including the Sugar Bowl win and going on two years of NCAA probation — were severe. But Ohio State changed its self-imposed penalties shortly before the hearing.

Not only could the NCAA committee tack on a bowl ban, it could also limit the Buckeyes' number of recruits, among other possibilities. The NCAA has informed Ohio State that the two most serious findings it could hit the school with — lack of institutional control and failure to monitor players and coaches are off the board based on information it has received so far.

No one from the public or media was permitted into the hearing room, a hotel ballroom which had 38 microphones placed on tables set up in a square. Guards were stationed outside the doors.

Tressel, eschewing his customary sweater vest for a gray suit, declined to answer questions as he hustled with his attorney through the hotel's lobby and slipped into an elevator.

He did leave behind a news release.

"I had an open and constructive exchange with the committee on infractions," the statement read. "They were well prepared and will now go about their work in deliberations. Again, I would like to apologize to the Buckeye nation, most especially to the players, staff and fans who remain so dear to me."

Ohio State President Gordon Gee also weighed in.

"I appreciated the opportunity to appear today." he said in a statement. "The committee treated us fairly and gave us ample time to share our perspective. Throughout, we have been determined to do what is right in responding to the information we discovered."

School officials held a five-hour strategy session with their lawyers at the hotel on Thursday night.

The central point of the hearing was the contention — admitted by Tressel — that he alone among Ohio State officials broke NCAA bylaws when he learned some of his players had accepted improper benefits from a Columbus tattoo-parlor owner in April 2010. He then declined to tell Ohio State or NCAA officials for more than nine months, contrary to his contract and other NCAA rules.

Tressel's decision led Ohio State to pressure him to step down in May after 10 seasons, a 106-22 record, seven Big Ten titles and the 2002 national championship. It also sparked the NCAA investigation.

Six Ohio State players were suspended for the first five games this fall for trading memorabilia for cash and discounted tattoos. Star quarterback Terrelle Pryor, one of those suspended players, gave up his final year of eligibility for a shot at playing in the NFL. One other player has left the program; yet another player will sit out the season-opener.

Smith told The Associated Press earlier this week that the investigations into the players' actions and those of Tressel have cost Ohio State's athletic department about \$800,000 so far. Records released by the university Friday showed how some of the money was spent. Ohio State paid \$270,000 to a New York PR firm to help it manage publicity stemming from the scandal, plus another \$162.000 to a Kansas firm that specializes in NCAA compliance consulting.
